Award winning author Jo Deurbrouck worked as a whitewater raft guide in Idaho for twelve seasons, mostly in Idaho, which bills itself "The Whitewater State" or sometimes "The Wild Rivers State." She remains a frequent wanderer down the rivers, up the mountains, and through the deserts, forests, and canyons of the West. She has contributed to the Washington Post, Christian Science Monitor, Paddler Magazine, Creative Nonfiction, Spokesman-Review, Post Register and other publications. She holds a M.A. in English from Boise State University. She lives in Idaho Falls with her husband and two dogs.

A meticulous researcher, Deurbrouck's work is guided by two beliefs. One is that the most useful, compelling and difficult thing a writer can do is attempt to tell the truth. The other is that a single unnecessary word spoils a sentence.

Her previous nonfiction book, which wears the politically incorrect title, *Stalked by a Mountain Lion: Fear, Fact and the Uncertain Future of Cougars in America,* was a revision of a book she coauthored with journalist Dean Miller. That book had an even more hyperbolic title: *Cat Attacks.* Despite the labeling, both were praised for their meticulous research and thoughtful storytelling by game managers, naturalists, and authors like cougar guru Harley Shaw (*Soul of Lion*) and nature writer David Quammen (*Song of the Dodo* and others).
